## Randolph County Opioid-Drug Community Collaborative

- 2016 – Randolph County BOCC allocated funds to support development of Collaborative
- 2017 – Convened community partners & launched coalition
- 2017 – 2019 Implemented initial action plan

### Key Accomplishments:

- Held informational community events to raise awareness & reduce stigma on substance use disorders
- Made materials available at the local library highlighting opioid use disorder, prevention, & treatment
- Implemented various overdose prevention campaigns utilizing multiple channels such as billboards & social media (Lock Your Meds)
- Established medication take back events & sites
- Increased access to naloxone, a life-saving opioid overdose-reversal first aid medication
- Secured grants to enable uninsured patients to receive behavioral health services
- Expanded access to substance use disorder treatment services & medications for addiction treatment via our local managed care organization, Sandhills Center
- Launched a syringe service program
- Offered Crisis Intervention Team training to local law enforcement
- Piloted post-overdose response team

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## NC Data, Trends

- **11** North Carolinians died each day from drug overdose (2021), 8 of which were due to opioids
- **More than 32,000** North Carolinians lost their lives to drug overdose (2000-2021)
- Many more people, families, and communities impacted

- harm reduction is a set of practical strategies and ideas aimed at reducing negative consequences associated with drug use.

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## Principles of Harm Reduction (Abbreviated)



- Drugs happen

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# Naloxone Distribution

- Naloxone restores breathing
- Make this first aid medication widely available
  - Syringe service programs, jails, health departments, hospitals, community gathering places, stock pharmacies






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# Syringe Services Programs

- Legalized In NC July 11, 2016
  - Any governmental or nongovernmental organization "that promotes scientifically proven ways of mitigating health risks associated with drug use and other high risk behaviors" can start a SSP
- Evidence-based (5-7x more likely to connect to treatment)
- Cost effective
  - \$0.10 unused syringe vs. \$100,000 for HCV treatment/person
